a message to teachers

The stories, choices and situations recounted in the film are similar to what many students are experiencing outside the classroom, which explains why the film resonates deeply with students. The *InsideOut* Teacher's Guide provides 6-12th graders a stand-alone classroom project that highlights the importance of education and the pitfalls of dropping out. The Guide includes questions to help stimulate discussion after viewing. We recommend these essay-style prompts as a way to provoke student introspection. Below is a preview of the Teacher's Guide.

discussion questions

If this film has a single message, what do you think it is? Provide examples.

Which scenes are the most powerful for you, and why?

Who, if anyone, is to blame for the situation in which the inmates find themselves? Is it the government, gang members or the inmates themselves? Use examples of dialog and situations from the movie to support your response.

Can you relate to any of the situations the inmates describe: The in-crowd on the corner? The easy money? Have you ever been tempted by this lifestyle? Explain your answer.

Does this movie inspire you to stay in school? Explain why or why not.
